# Methodology

This national survey was conducted among 1,000 likely 2018 general election voters.

All interviews were conducted from June 15<sup>th</sup> to June 19<sup>th</sup>, 2018. All interviews were conducted online and survey invitations were distributed randomly within predetermined geographic units.

These units were structured to correlate with actual voter turnout nationwide in a general election.

The sample of 1,000 likely general election voters has an accuracy of +/- 3.1% at a 95% confidence interval.

Margin of error increases for cross-tabulations.

The numbers in this presentation have been rounded and may not equal 100%.

# Major Findings

- 1. By overwhelming margins, voters in virtually every subgroup strongly believe that it is not fair or right to allow a particular group of illegal immigrants to “jump the line” and be awarded the benefits of legal status and a potential pathway to US citizenship before the hundreds of thousands of potential legal immigrants who have followed the law and waited for years and, in many cases, paid thousands of dollars to immigration attorneys to ensure they are complying with US law.**
- 2. By a significant margin, voters — and the subgroups we’re particularly interested in (Trump voters, GOP voters) — do not trust that if a deal is reached that trades amnesty for illegal immigrants now in exchange for a border wall and a secure border later, the border wall will ever be built and the border will never be secured.**
- 3. The plurality of voters chooses “don’t reward them for being illegal immigrants” when given the option of three.**
- 4. By a margin of 42% to 25% among ALL likely voters, and by a margin of 61% to 18% among GOP voters and 59% to 19% among Trump voters, voters would be LESS LIKELY to vote to re-elect a GOP Member of Congress who voted to provide amnesty for a group of illegal immigrants.**

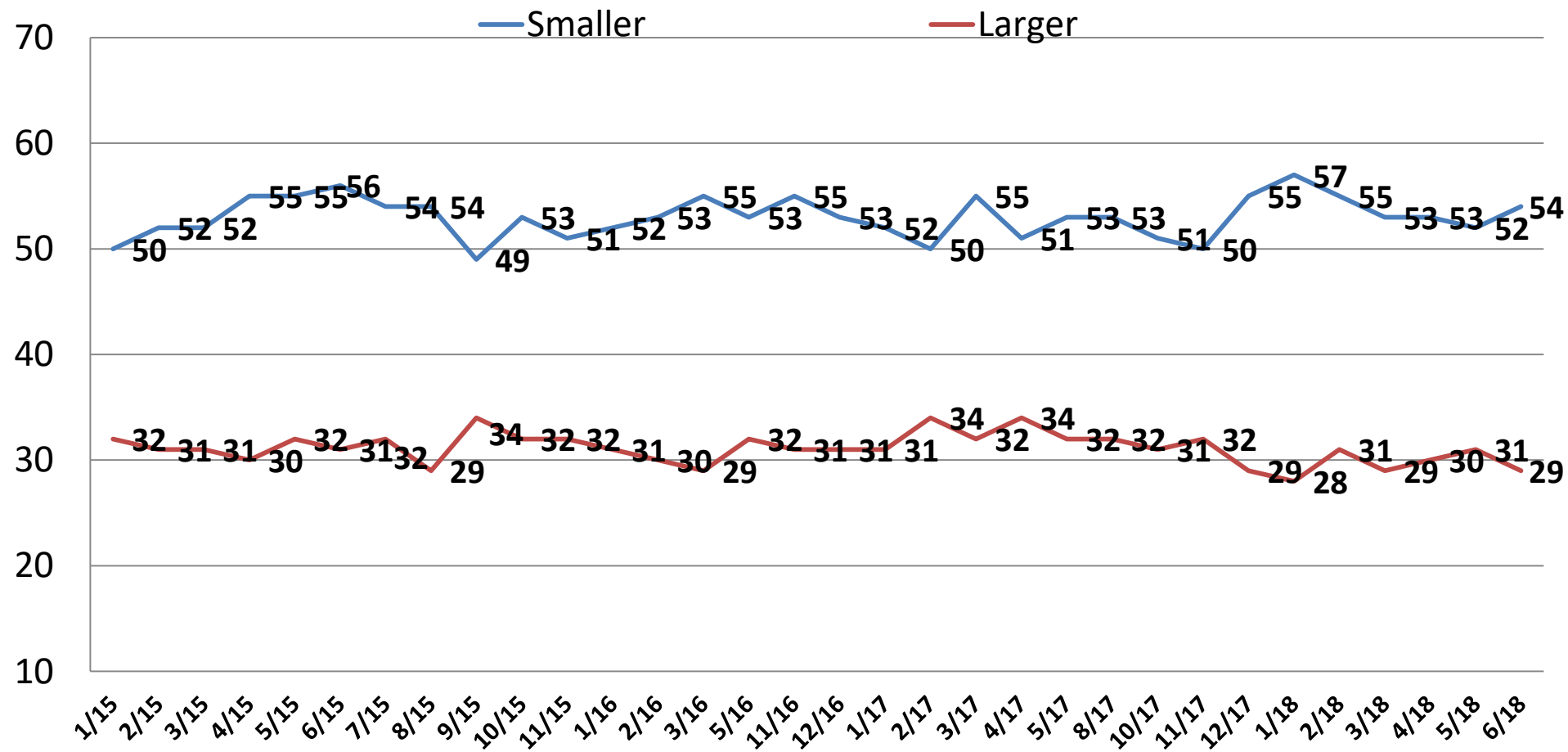


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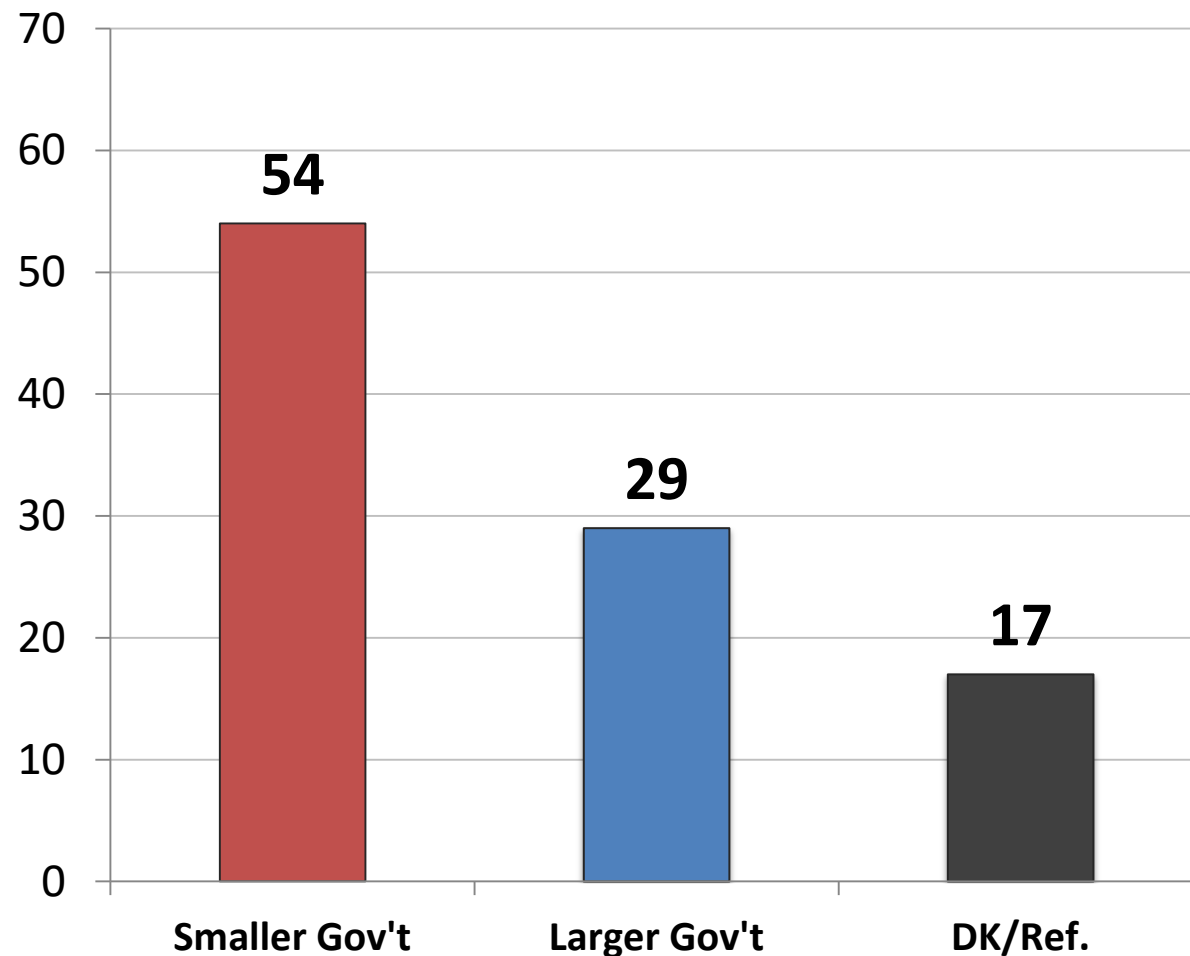

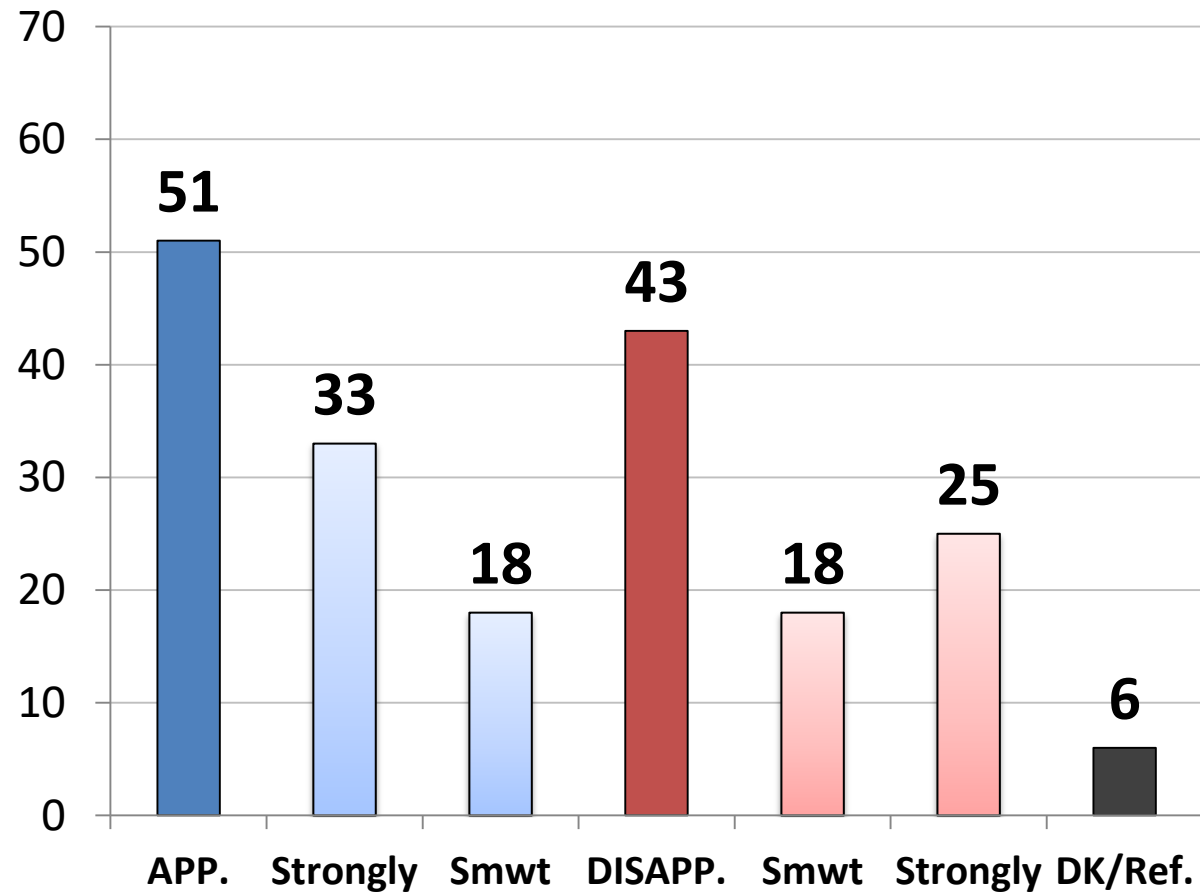
# Do you approve or disapprove of repealing and replacing the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, also known as “Obamacare?”

*-Time Series-*



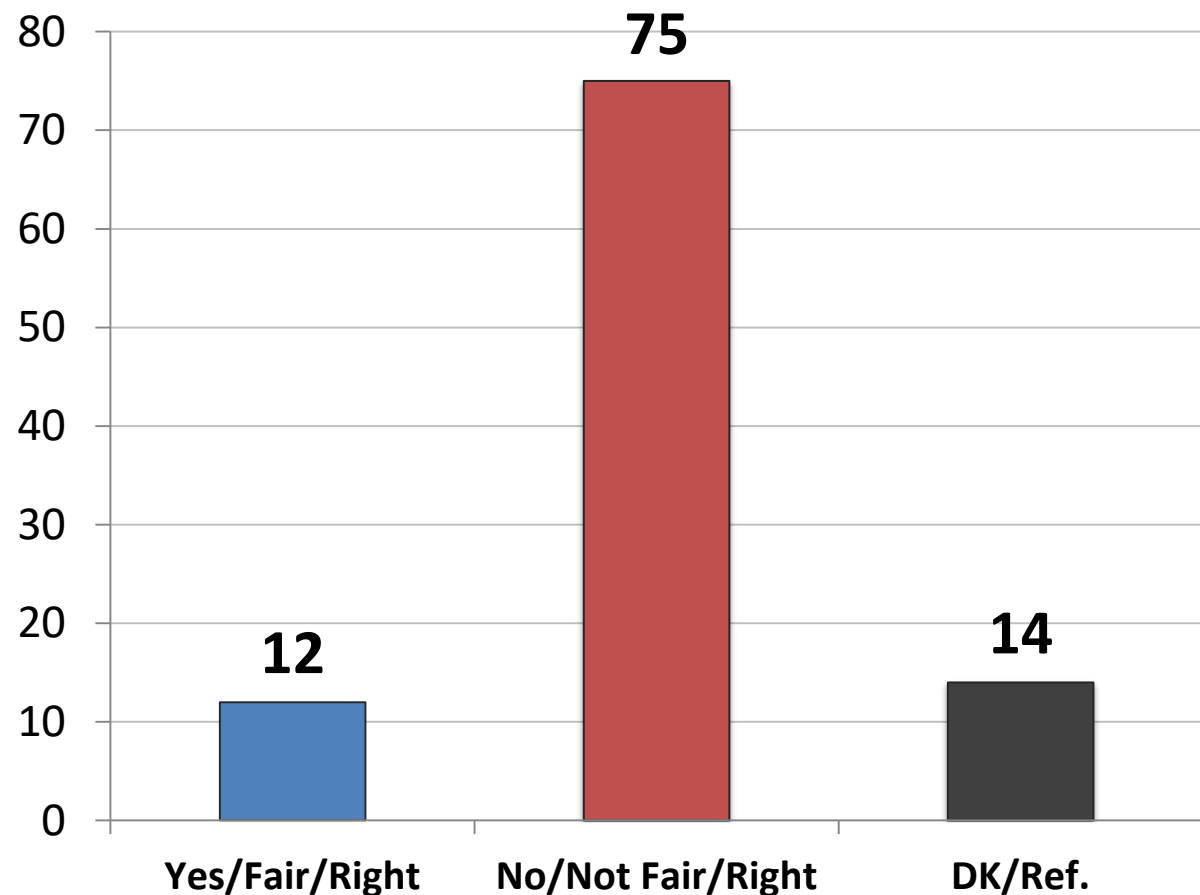

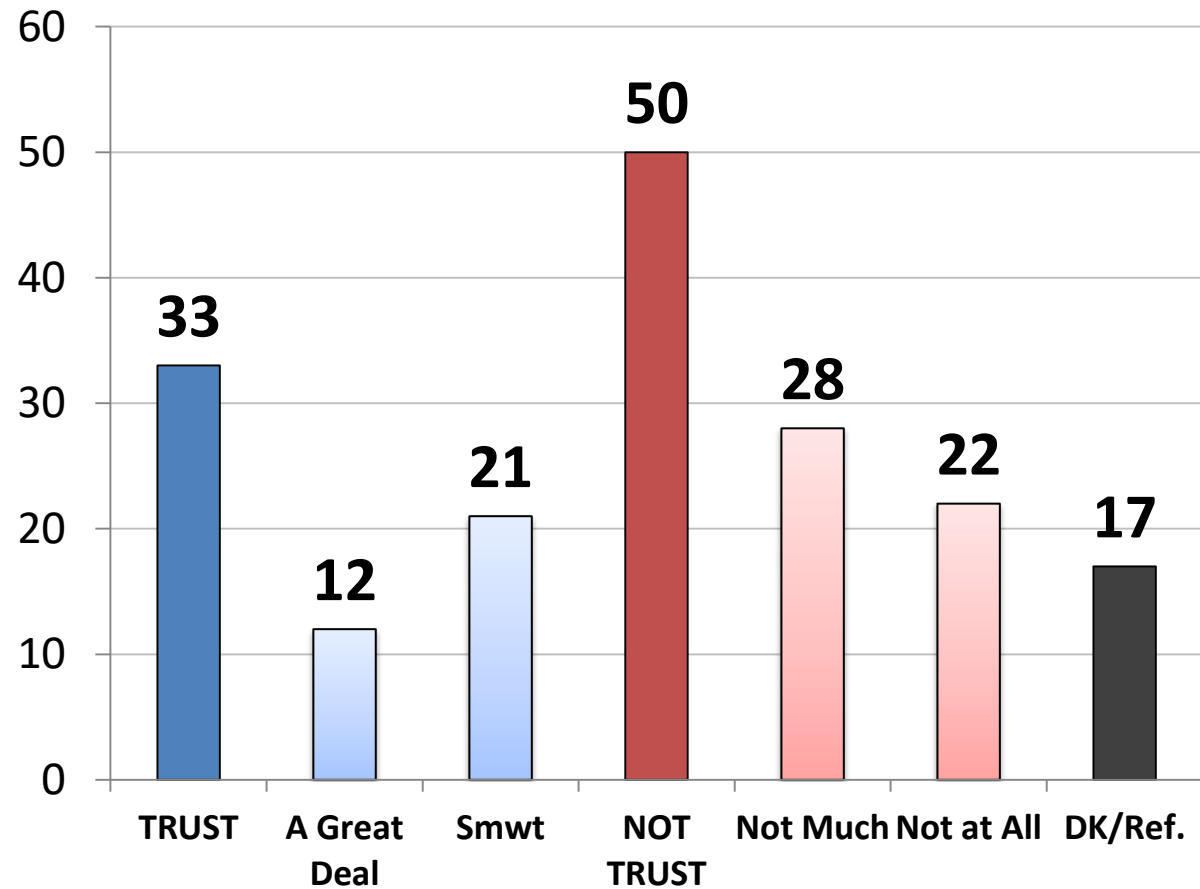

The last time Congress and the President came together to compromise on immigration was 1986. 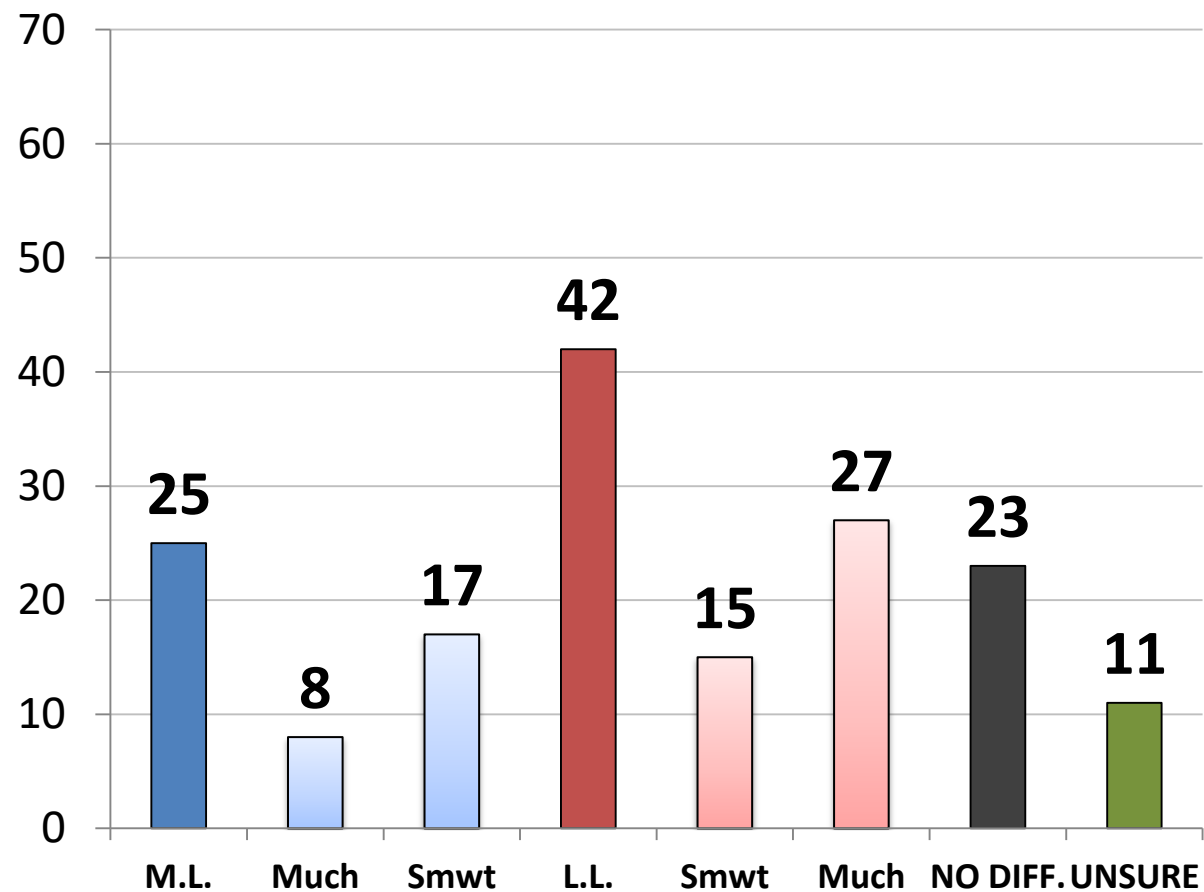
In 2012, President Obama signed an executive action directing that the federal government would no longer deport a certain group of illegal immigrants, sometimes called “Dreamers” or “DACA recipients.” In 2017, based on a Supreme Court decision blocking a similar executive action by President Obama, President Trump directed that this particular program be ended, and called on Congress to pass a new law. Some in Congress want to grant them full citizenship. Others in Congress want to grant them legal status, without any special pathway to citizenship. Still others in Congress believe they are illegal immigrants, and should not be rewarded for being illegal immigrants. Which comes closest to your view?
